Rev. Baumgartner,
Brunswick Native,
To Deliver Sermon

The Rev. Hugh E. Baumgartner, Jr., will deliver the baccalaureate sermon message to the 1937 Glynn Academy graduating class Sunday at 11 a.m. at the Memorial Auditorium.

The speaker is a native of Brunswick, and a graduate of Glynn Academy's class of 1933. He received his Bachelor of Arts Degree from Lenoir Rhyne College, Hickory, N. C.; and his B. D. degree from the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary, Columbia, S. C.

Since 1935, he has served congregations in Georgia and Alabama, erecting new church buildings in Elberton, Ga., Mobile, Ala., Anniston, Ala., and Macon, Ga., where he is now pastor of the Lutheran Church of the Redeemer.

Mr. Baumgartner has served on the Board of Trustees of the Georgia-Alabama Synod in America, the Executive Committee of the United Lutheran Church in America, and Chairman of the Committee for the Reception of New Congregations into the Georgia-Alabama Synod.

At present, he is advisor of the Luther League of his Synod, was a member of the staff of the Luther League of America convention at Miami University of Ohio in 1933, and will serve in a similar position at the University of Kansas this summer.

Mr. Baumgartner is married to Frances Wisdom of Elberton and Atlanta, Ga. They have four children.

Interesting Program
Enjoyed Last Night
At Lanier Field

The weather man really behaved himself last night to the delight of 222 Glynn Academy graduates. Board of Education officials, teachers and hundreds of members of the families of the graduates and others who attended the graduation exercises of the high school at Sidney, Lanier Field last night.

Rain threatened throughout the day until late afternoon, when the sun made its first appearance of the day and from then on fine, but rather cool weather prevailed.

The program was held at the football field because there was ample room in the stadium to seat the many who planned to attend, while had the exercises been at the Memorial Auditorium only a limited number of people could have attended.

All of the addresses were by honor students of the class, and they drew many fine comments from the audience. The large class, 222, were seated in chairs on the ground, while the speakers stepped upon an improvised stand to make their addresses. A loud speaker was used and everyone could hear the address very distinctly.

"Speak Ye Golden Isles," was the theme of the program, and the speakers were Hamlin Boswell, Patricia Griffin, Sanford Mock, Rebecca Browning and James R. Bruce. The subject of each was one of the nearby local islands, and their talks were all enjoyed. The invocation was by the Rev. Harry V. Chafin, and after the program the class was presented the superintendent by James A. Warren, principal of Glynn Academy, and the class was presented the Board of Education by R. Hood, superintendent of schools. Diplomas were delivered to the graduates by W. A. Whittle, president of the Board of Education. The graduates had been seated in order of their names and in this way the diplomas were passed out in rapid order.

Soupy Ice Cream Days Over For Local Hospital Patients

The days of being served soupy ice cream and luke-warm coffee are apparently at an end—at least for the patients at the Brunswick hospital.

Hot foods hot—cold foods cold—that's the way patients here will be receiving their food from now on, W. H. Kilby, hospital administrator, said today.

Four shiny new "meals-on-wheels," each a complete service

system which takes care of 20 patients, were placed in service for the evening hospital meal yesterday. Three more are expected soon.

According to Mr. Kilby, the serving unit is the most modern available. Although the local hospital has used conventional food warming devices for some time, there is little comparison to the quality of service given by the special units, the administrator asserted.

Each serving unit cost about \$1,480, making the total investment for seven \$10,360.

Two each were donated by the Hospital Auxiliary and through the Way and Nightingale Estate hospital fund, he said, and the other three will be purchased through the equipment budget of the new hospital addition.

The units, measuring nearly three by six feet, are electrically heated and cooled in different compartments.

As each tray is removed, tagged for the individual patient, the hot and cold foods are placed on it from the special sections.

Liquids, either milk, tea, coffee, hot or cold, are drawn from containers attached to the top of the unit and placed on the tray which can then be immediately taken to the patient's bedside.

The quick transfer of the food is due to the mobility of the unit which may be moved down the halls from one door to the next as the meals are delivered.

One person, the diet maid, can handle the unit, whereas before it took as many as five and distribute the meals in about half the normal time, the administrator declared. He estimated that 20 meals, from one serving unit, can be delivered in a normal time of about 30 minutes.

Besides the advantage to the patient in receiving more palatable meals, the special units should be an economy in the long run, Mr. Kilby explained. He said he expects the units to pay for themselves within two years in labor saved.
