Academy Senior Third in State Science Testing

Douglas Bruce, Glynn Academy senior, has been selected for an honorable mention award in the Westinghouse state science talent search.

As a result of his high score on a test and in recognition of his basic research work, Douglas placed third in Georgia. The two higher awards were won by Atlanta students.

Douglas, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Bruce, of East Beach, was one of six Glynn Academy seniors to take the test last December. The stiff examination included questions taken from all phases of science—biology, chemistry, physics, mathematics, astronomy, geology, electronics.

He has been invited by the Georgia Junior Academy of Sciences to present a paper on his research work at a meeting in Athens April 8. The academy is composed of top high school science students from throughout the state. The topic of the paper to be presented is "The Extraction of Titanium from Beach Sand."

Douglas has done over six months' work on this topic in his Chemistry II class. In this study, he has discovered that some local beach sand contains as high as three per cent titanium. By a simple sludging process, he has been able to step up the percentage content of this valuable metal to 25 per cent. At the present time, he is attempting to extract the metal from the sand in a high-amperage, helium-atmosphere electric furnace.

Serving as president of the local Science Club, Bruce recently led his organization in sponsoring Glynn Academy's first science fair. Along with 16 other Glynn Academy students, Douglas will enter his project in the state Science Fair competitions in Athens in April.

Besides being an honor student at Glynn Academy, Douglas is active in the Math Club and the annual staff. He is planning to major in chemistry at the University of Florida next year.

Restriction Seen on Power Boats Near Beaches

Game and Fish Director Lovell said Tuesday he will recommend the operation of power boats in all public beach areas. A restriction is contemplated, he said, because shrimp boat operators have been dragging so close to shore at Jekyll Island that swimmers have been endangered.

He received a new commission Monday morning from a beach resident concerned with a similar situation. He advised the caller to discuss the problem with beach commissioner Jimmy Brown and the city council.

He said he hoped the mayor's council would make a recommendation to him before the July 15th commission and Fish Commission.

The action was prompted by an appeal from the Jekyll Island Authority Chairman Fortson who said shrimp boats were coming so close to shore that swimmers had been leaving the water to avoid being struck by cables or nets.

In addition, he said, the shrimp boats were dumping dead fish and debris into off-shore waters. The mess was accumulating on the beaches. He said it constituted a health hazard.

He said he may ask the commission to designate waters off the beach as "fish sanctuaries." This would keep all power boats out.

Areas would be marked by buoys and the boating restriction would be enforced by members of the Fish Commission. If enacted, he said, the regulation would "be a definite violation would be a misdemeanor."

He said the department "will make a definite recommendation" to the commission at the July 15th meeting.

Fortson, when informed of Lovell's tentative plan, said, "That's just what I need. The shrimping boats on the beaches is a health hazard and a safety hazard," he said.

He said the shrimp operators were "willing to talk about it" — but they had refused to do so.

J. Robert Bruce Succumbs After Extended Illness

James Robert Bruce, well known real estate and insurance executive, died last night at the Brunswick hospital after a long illness.

Mr. Bruce, 48, was a native of Glynn County and a partner in the Bruce Realty and Insurance Co., and the Park View Motel. He was also a member of the Brunswick Bar Assn. and a practicing attorney for many years.

At the time of his death, Mr. Bruce was a member of the Board of Education, the loan committee of Brunswick Federal Savings and Loan Assn., the Fire and Casualty Underwriters' Assn., the executive committee of the United Community fund, and Christ Church, Frederica. He was a former member of the vestry, serving as clerk.

Besides his wife, Mr. Bruce is survived by two sons, James Robert, Jr., a Georgia Tech student, and Douglas, a senior at Glynn Academy; his mother, Mrs. Ed C. Bruce, East Beach; two brothers, Charles D. and Edward C., both of Brunswick; and a sister, Mrs. Nathan Brown.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow at 11 a.m. at Christ Church, Frederica. Dr. Junius Martin, rector, will officiate, assisted by the Rev. Frederick Cousins and the Rev. Jack Lowndes, pastor of the First Baptist Church. Burial will follow in Christ Churchyard under the direction of Edo Miller and Sons Funeral Home.
