The Rev. Thomas Hasell of St. Thomas' Parish, S.C., born in England, died in St. Thomas' Parish, Oct. 9, 1744, graduated Cambridge University, England, ordained deacon by Bishop Compton of London, Apr. 10, 1705, came immediately to Charleston, S.C., was the first of the descendants of John Hasell, spoken of by Sir Bernard Burke as being buried in the Bottisham Church in 1572, who came to America. He visited England in 1709, and was ordained priest by Bishop Compton, July 10, 1709. Upon his return to South Carolina he became the first Episcopal minister of the parish of St. Thomas and St. Denis, S.C.

The name is spelled with one s and is pronounced Hazel.

The following extracts from his "Genealogical and Biographical Dictionary", by Sir Bernard Burke Ulster King of Arms, refers to this family, who were among the earlier settlers of Cambridgeshire (England) thus: "The Hasells were first settled in Cambridgeshire, England, where several burials occur in the register of Bottisham Church. as John Hasell, Sep. 13, 1572, and his widow, Agnes, Oct. 23, 1575. Sir Edward Hasell, knighted by King William III was the first of the family who settled in Cumberland, he purchased Dalemain from the co-heiresses of the ancient family of de Laytons in 1665.

The arms and crest were granted to the ancestors of the Rev. Thomas Hasell shortly after the English Herald College became a corporate body during the reign of Richard III, when "armorial bearings became the exclusive right of the bearer and were hereditary." At that time, and since, "every gentleman entitled to bear court armour, was noble, whether titled or not. It is only in comparative recent times that this has been forgotten, and the term nobility, exclusively appropriated to the peerage."

(569) Dr. Henry Woodward - b. in England ca 1746. resided in Carolina - came 1st as member of Sandford's fleet June 16, 1666 - from 1670 to about 1686-1690 He died in the summer of 1686 en route from Ogeechee to Charlestown. Was Member of Grand Council, 1677, as deputy of Lord Shaftesbury. Considered 1st white settler of S. Carolina

(583) Col John Godfrey born in England - came from Barbadoes about 1640 resided in Carolina from 1670 to 1690. Died 1690 at Charlestown SC. Was Member of the Grand Council, 1671, 1682 to 1690; appointed Deputy to Earl of Craven, May 1671, President of Council and acting governor for Gov West Apr 27 - June 12, 1675

(571) Col. James Stanfair - born probably in England resided in S Carolina from before 1685 to 1703 Was Member Commons House of Assembly 1685,

1692, 1696, 1700, 1703, 1711.

(507) John Ward - born in S Carolina 1706. resided in Province of S. Carolina from 1706 to 1758. Died 1758 at St John's Berkeley. Was Justice of the Peace, Berkeley 1756

(513) John Ashby Cassique born in England resided in S. Carolina from 1682 to 1716. Died Nov. 30, 1716 at "Carolina" St. Thomas and St. Denis Parish. Was Cassique 1682, Receiver General 1706-1708; Commissioner under the Church Acts 1704 and 1706; Member ^{Commons} House of Assembly 1698, 1700

(511) The Reverend Thomas Morrill - born in England resided in Province S Carolina from before 1717 to 1740. Died 1740. Was Rector St. George's Parish Winyah (Georgetown) 1728-1734; Rector Prince Frederick's Parish 1734-1735. Missionary in St. Philip's Parish for Society for Propagation of Gospel in foreign parts for setting up grammar school and ordained minister 1717

The Hon. Noble Wimberley Jones M. D. b. England (Lambeth-Suffolk Co.) 1723 - resided in Province Georgia (and at times in S.C.) from 1723 to 1805. Died Jan 9, 1805 at Savannah Georgia. Was Commander of Horse Troop against Indians, 1751; Justice for Christ Church Parish, Member Council of Safety, Member Commons House of Assembly 1756, 1768, 1769, 1773. Was sent with patriots from Charleston to St. Augustine 1780. S.C. Am Gazette Dec 16, 1780. M^cCrady Hist SC III p. 857
